

Harriers claim victory

Sergeants claim city relay victory

In keeping with the varsity, the JV harriers swept the city relays while breaking two records and totaling up almost twice as many points as their nearest competitor. In action tonight the Sergeants test their power against an unpredictable Jefferson squad.

"WE CAN'T take them lightly," stated Coach Gary Nobel in reference to the Jefferson team. "Their strength will be dependent upon how many members they drop down from the varsity squad."

Records were set in the distance medley and the mile relay during competition in the city relays. Mike Huffsmith, John Othus, Frank Wall, and Rick Rosenbloom made up the distance medley team which knocked 14 seconds off of the old record and crossed the line with an 11:13.6 clocking.

OTHUS AND Huffsmith doubled back and along with Neil Kuhnhausen managed to lower the standard by 1.2 seconds.

"We are quite happy with the job done in the relays," stated Coach Nobel. "We have done our job, but there is still a lot of work to do," he added.

The Sergeants claimed victory

in seven events while they captured the meet. Events which were won by the team were the 440 relay, two-mil relay, shuttle hurdles, mile relay, high jump relay, and the high jump. "We are the defending city champions and with a little work we should be ready for it this year," concluded Mr. Nobel.

Harriers capture invitational; G-Men look for state crown

The state championship seems to head the wanted list of the varsity harriers. Last Friday they ran, jumped and tossed themselves one victory closer to that goal as they captured the eight-team Corvallis Invitational.

The Generals competed in the meet along with North Eugene, Marshfield, Centennial, Corvallis, David Douglas, South Salem and Lake Oswego, and by capturing one event, placing second in five, gaining third in three

and fourth in six the team managed to gain 98½ points. This score was good enough to finish the G-Men 5½ points ahead of North Eugene.

The meet was full of outstanding performances but all of these were overshadowed by the two-mile event in which Steve Prefontaine broke the national standard by 6.8 seconds.

Ralph Bakkensen claimed the only victory for the Generals as he put the shot 56'10". This effort put Bakkensen 5'8" ahead of his nearest competitor. The G-Men claimed second place in the 440 relay with a time of 43.6. They also placed second in the mile relay with a clocking of 3:25.7.

The Generals picked up points in the javelin as Dave Edwards claimed second place and Steve Hopkins third, while tossing within 1¼ feet of each other. Bruce Douthit picked up the second place honors in the pole vault as he cleared the bar at 13'0". Barry Heidt also cleared 13'0" but was awarded fourth place because of misses.

Ed Giest gained the last second place title, in the low hurdles, while stopping the clock at 20.6.

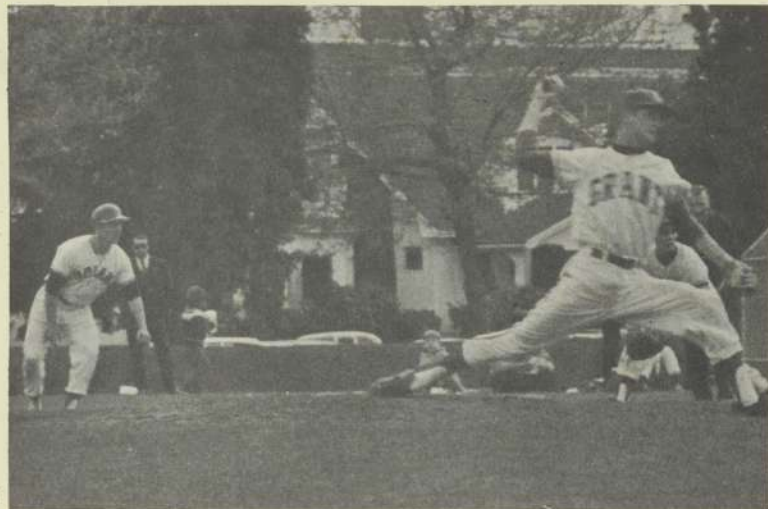

G-Men defeat Cleveland, 2-1; Sandbaggers open round two

In action last week the Generals' baseball team shellacked the Lincoln Cardinals 14-0 in a rain-soaked game, and managed to squeak by second-place Cleveland 2-1.

Jamie Eoff, Grant's ace hurler who has yet to give up an earned run this year, threw a one-hitter at Lincoln and helped his cause by hitting a triple to deep left center field with men on base. A slight rainfall fell throughout most of the game; but it didn't seem to bother the team any as they punched out many base hits and were aided by several Lincoln errors. Eoff is now leading the PIL in pitching with a .000 earned run average.

Last Friday's long-awaited game with the Cleveland Indians proved to be victorious for the G-Men because they knocked Cleveland out of first place with a 2-1 victory. In previous games the Indians had only lost one game and that was to the Madison Senators with whom they shared the league lead. The loss moved the Generals within one-half game of the Indians and one and one-half off of the pace set by Madison.

Dick Paulson pitched a fine for the G-Men, giving up only three hits in the first two innings and no hits in the last five. Dan Percich got the winning hit with a single to right center. This hit drove in Greg Walsh who scored the run the Generals needed to win.

The Cleveland game was the last game of the first half and the Generals ended up with an 8-2 win-loss record. Cleveland finished with an 8-2 record while Madison claimed top honors with a 9-1 record.

The second round of play began this week with each team trying to gain the second-half championship. The winner of this round will play the first-round champ Madison to determine the team which will go to the state tournament.
