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STATEMENT ON SCHOOL DISRUPTION

For several days racial disturbances have occurred at Roosevelt High School. Cool-headed students, responsible faculty, community members and prompt intervention by police at school request have averted more serious problems. At no time were classes suspended and they will not be suspended.

It is important, however, at this time to make clear to all students, to all faculties, to all parents and to the community the position of this public school system.

1. Schools are going to be open regardless of any activities by any persons who attempt to obstruct them. This includes non-students who have no business on school grounds. Students have a right to an education and we intend to protect that right.
2. It is the policy of the Board of Education to ask the assistance of the Police Department whenever disturbance interrupts regular school activities. Uniformed police will be present when and where necessary to insure the safety and tranquility of each student at school.
3. We ask each student, each teacher and each parent to assume personal responsibility to encourage the kind of sober civil relationships which make life worth living. We ask everyone to reject people who arouse violence for vicious purposes.
4. Schools are for young men and women who believe in reason. Otherwise we are all wasting our time on this planet.

Completion time nears for 1968-69 yearbook

Still to be completed for the 1968-69 Memoirs are the pages on track, which won't be finished until after the state meet, the index, and the commencement pages, all of which must be completed by June 12.

When these pages go to

the printer the 1968-69 yearbook, which includes 352 pages—16 in color—will be completed. The book is scheduled for delivery to students September 4. Information about the distribution will be posted at school and publicized on one or more local radio stations.

According to Advisor Willard Mohn, fall delivery was decided on for this year because of a considerable number of complaints made by students. If the book is delivered before school is out—in May or June—no activities taking place after April 1 would be included, due to deadlines and the printing schedule.

There is a national trend toward fall delivery as it permits full year coverage. This year, for the first time, the Rose Festival activities will be run in color, and coverage of the junior dance, the senior prom (in color), the Spring Show, commencement activities (in color), the conclusion of the baseball season, and complete information on golf, track, and tennis will be possible.

"There has been considerable agitation by a number of students who feel that they won't have the opportunity to sign their books. But with the books delivered before classes start in the fall, students will be enabled to get the signatures of students still in the area," Mr. Mohn explained.

Students who are working out of town can have their parents, brothers, or sisters pick up their yearbook. The books will be distributed alphabetically according to class in the rooms on the first floor.

After the first day they will be available in room 207, from 9-12 and 1-4. A few extra books will be available at that time, or they can be ordered before school is out for \$5.00 in the Student Body store.

The 1969-70 yearbook is tentatively set for distribution in May 1970, subject to the reaction of students toward the 1969 issue.

Contracts for the production of the 1970 Memoirs have been signed, with the approval of Dr. Roy O. Malo. Printing will be done by Taylor Publishing Company and senior pictures will be taken by Luzader Studios.

Students simulate security council with teachers' aid

Bruce Fishback, Margaret Fraser, Steve Gerrard, and Jeff Klein participated in a "mock" security council along with their teachers, Pamela Hall and David Warren, at Portland State University on May 17. Hillsboro high school students and PSU students also participated in the activity.

The object of the mock council meeting was to try to pass resolutions from the country that one represents on world issues. The students attempted to defend the position of their country and to bring out questions from that point of view.

Bruce Fishback, who represented Russia, stated that the first resolutions he brought out failed because the countries that should have voted with the Soviet Union voted against it.

Four questions were discussed. They were Southern Rhodesia, Biafra, the Portuguese territories, and the Middle East crisis. Margaret Fraser represented Hungary, Steve Gerrard represented Algeria, and Jeff Klein represented Hungary.

Each question was discussed individually by the student members of the council and then the resolutions, which were previously composed, were voted upon.

"I was loud and obstinate when anything slanderous was said against the U.S.S.R.," declared Bruce Fishback. "It was really fun!"

Steve Gerrard commented, "It was kind of interesting being a Communist country because we got to view everything from a different perspective. It was interesting because it was like a verbal warfare between the countries."
