Elena said of her one-year stay in America, "I was homesick at first; there was such a language barrier. The girl sitting next to me in all my classes used to relate all of the assignments because I couldn't understand the teacher."

Both Ingse and Elena felt that the AFS assembly the day of the Spring Carnival was one of the highlights of the year. "During the assembly I felt that Grant was really my school—I almost cried," confided Elena.

To Ingse, school was nothing special, she enjoyed talking to college students and adults con-

cerning their views on various subjects, and went skiing over Christmas vacation.

There are differences among Elena's and Ingse's countries and America. At home in Argentina Elena attends school from 1-5:30 p.m., and found getting up for school at 8 a.m. very hard at first. Teachers in Argentina keep things on a formal basis, unlike the

friendly informal way at Grant.

As Ingse pointed out, it is hard to judge all of America by Portland. She is looking forward to the boat trip home and talking to fellow Norwegians who lived the East and southern states.

"Most of my greatest times will probably come to me when I get home this summer," Ingse concluded.

Elena stated, "I really want to thank everyone at Grant and my wonderful American family. I'm really glad that I'm here, everyone has helped me so much."

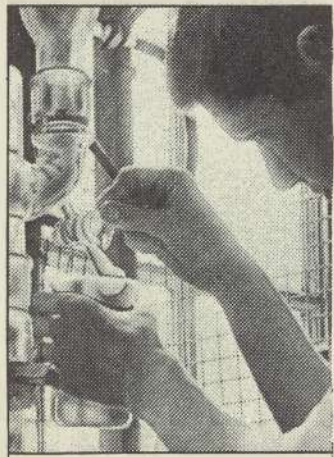
