

Dorothy Pantenburg wins highest lifesaving award

Dorothy Pantenburg, who is in charge of the swimming activities in the renovated Grant pool, recently received the highest award given by the Red Cross.

Mrs. Pantenburg was presented with the Life Saving Award of Merit for successfully restoring the breathing of John McMahon, who had drowned seconds before she arrived. The plaque bears the signature of President Nixon.

Two days before a Metropolitan Life convention, in June of 1968, the Pantenburgs were preparing for a swim in the pool at their Penticton, B.C. hotel, when Mrs. Pantenburg heard screams coming from the pool area. She immediately ran in the direction of the screams.

A man's body, McMahon, was just being pulled from the pool when she arrived.

"I checked his mouth for any foreign matter first, and then began applying the back pressure-arm lift method of artificial respiration," Mrs. Pantenburg reminisced.

After about a half hour of continued respiration efforts, Mrs. Pantenburg felt the restoration of the breathing in McMahon's body.

At about this time, an ambulance arrived on the scene and at the request of the driver, she accompanied McMahon in the ambulance. She rode in the back and applied an oxygen mask to McMahon to help his breathing.

Suddenly, she noticed that the man had stopped breathing. His heart had likewise stopped. She quickly folded her hands on McMahon's chest and began pumping again. It proved successful after a few moments.

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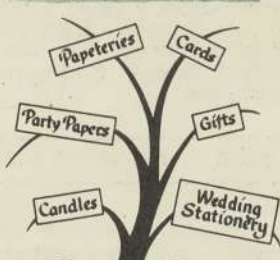
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
