

'Excellent season' concludes Forensics gains awards; last meet held for NFL

"Dad's Club is concluding its '69-70 year," commented Mr. Ray Feves, Dad's Club president. "It was an excellent season," he enthused.

Last night new officers were elected. "There is a real promising roster of officers for next year," Mr. Feves informed, although no definite results were available at press time.

"All City Dad's Club met with 13 school principals at Grant," Mr. Feves continued. "We tried to sit down and listen to their

problems." As a result of this meeting, and of others like it (with members of the School Board, the Juvenile authorities, the Administration, the vice-principals, et al) an eleven-point program was developed by the All City Dad's. A meeting on Wednesday investigated the possibility of incorporating this eleven-point program.

"Grant High Dad's have led the way in this thing," Mr. Feves went on. "The All-City Dad's are going to work on these ideas—we're concentrating our efforts on a trespassing law and a loitering law, among other ideas," he continued.

"The Dad's Club is trying to make the schools safe for all the youngsters," Mr. Feves went on, "and also trying to discipline

the in-school juvenile hoodlum—we're trying to rehabilitate him."

Mr. Feves reported that the Dad's Club meetings have been very well attended—various department representatives have been invited to attend the meetings and explain the activities of that particular department. "Last week, Rocky Menashe told us about Gendrills; before that a rep from the commission of Umpires and Referees came; and also Mrs. Anderson has come; a math department rep; Vocational Guidance; and so on," explained Mr. Feves.

"We're trying to give the kids of Grant an hour and a half of our time," Mr. Feves said. "Next year, you too come and be a 'Big Daddy to 2600 kids,'" he implored.

Many awards have come off late to the speech department in the form of honors, trophies and ribbons.

Sophomore Tom Callaghan has won competition at both the club level and the zone level in a contest sponsored by the Optimists. Tom's last victory, in the zone contest, was held at the Jade West restaurant Tuesday, April 28. Having won that, Tom is free to go to Yakima, Washington, May 14-15, for competition with the winner going to more competition in Los Angeles.

Another sophomore, Mark Johnson, has tried his wings with the Optimists and has won at another level of competition.

Other awards befell us in a meet held last weekend at Reynolds High School. Trophy winners included Marc Lowenthal, radio; Gregg Weaver, poetry; and Pat Campagna, information. These three each brought home a second place trophy.

Finalists in the Reynolds meet were Greg Weaver, information; Marc Lowenthal, poetry; winners in above; and first year student Alicia Perkins, poetry.

'Gospel Sing-Out' to help new choir

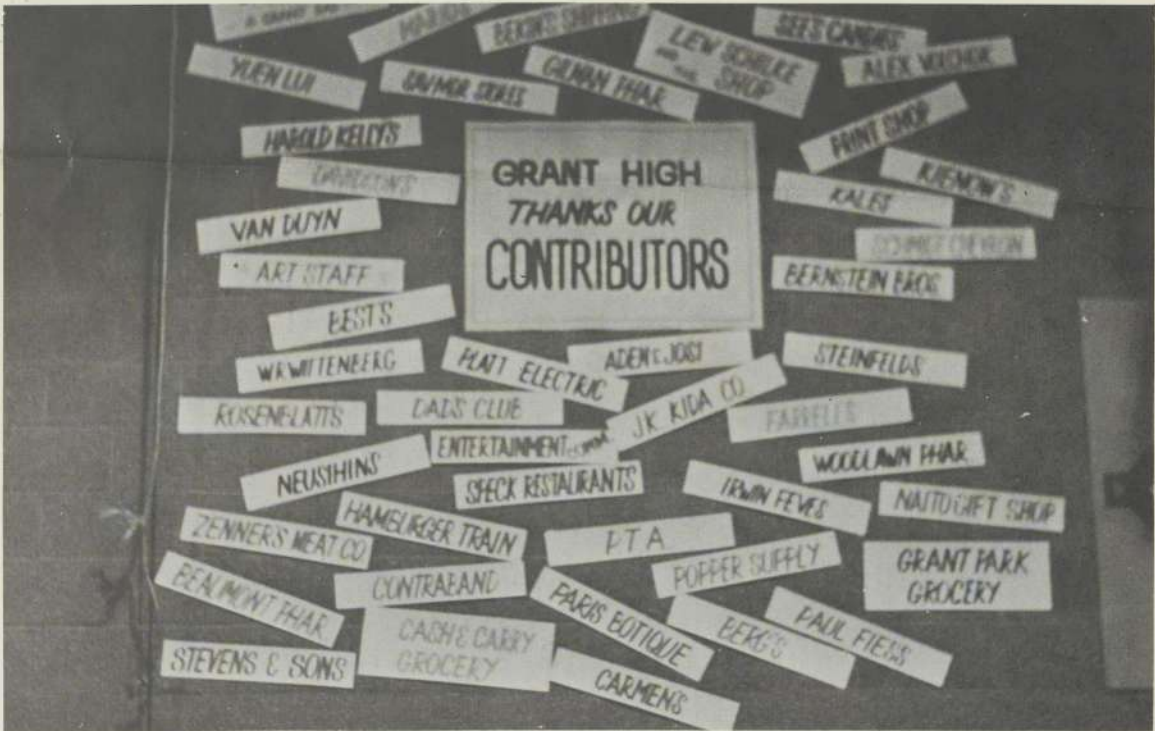
At the beginning of May the choir sang on the television pro-
