THE GOLD MINES.—The discovered mines at Camp Dated Creek District, between Prescott and Wyckenburg, received here is creating a decided sensation. It is exceedingly rich with free gold on Montgomery, corner of Washington street. The wife of John Carter of Alameda, sued her husband on the Fifteenth District Court for a divorce, and a man named McLaughlin, was witness in her behalf. A THUNDER STORM.—Last Monday and Tuesday the weather was very warm. Tuesday afternoon it became very oppressive, and resulted in the severest thunderstorm that has ever visited this place since the country has been settled by white people. About 6 o'clock in the evening a dark, cold came up in the southwest, and in a short time the lightning commenced flashing in every direction, followed by terrific claps of thunder and some rain. A number of trees were set on fire in consequence of a lightning stroke. A bright fire blazed on the west side of Spencer Butte, and one on the foot hills south of town. A great many trees were struck by lightning. There was another thunder storm on Wednesday evening, but not so violent. Lightning is very unusual in this country.—Engle Journal.

LETTERS FROM CAMP DATE CREEK, ARIZONA. May, 27th, states that William Kelly, owner of a ranch in Kirkland Valley, was attacked by seven Indians. Kelly repulsed them after a desperate fight killing one and running them through the ranch of William Columbral. The latter attacked them and killed four others. Three escaped.

Letters from the same locality state that in Martinez District, forty miles north of Wyckenburg, and same distance west of Prescott, in the worst Apache locality in Arizona, immense ledges of gold-bearing quartz have been discovered. Samples of rock received by steamer to-day are almost pure gold, richer than the best ever seen from Grass Valley. A rush has already commenced to the district, and the chances are the Indians will be driven out.

Yreka, June 14.—A rich gold-bearing quartz ledge has been discovered near Yreka by W. Mallory, who has worked for seven years, led on by my various workings of a divining rod. The rock crushed averaged \$17 to the pound.
