Star Trek's "Mr. Scott"

Voyage with Scottie of the Enterprise

Chief Engineer Scott will materialize on Oct. 15, 1977, at 8 p.m. in Clackamas Community Randall Gym.

James Doohan plays the character Lieutenant Montgomery Scott in the series "Star Trek." "Scottie", as he is more commonly known, is the chief engineering officer of the star ship, "Enterprise." His job is to run the engineering department. As third in command, "Scottie" is in charge when Captain Kirk and Mr. Spock are absent, or off the ship.

Pioneering in live television, Doohan has acted in over 4,000 radio shows, 100 stage plays and 400 live and taped television shows.

"Star Trekking with Scottie" will be Doohan's own ideas on the origin of the show, a complete Star Trek episode and a reel of bloopers from the filming of Trek.

A reception will follow the Association of Student Government sponsored event.

Tickets for "Star Trekking with Scottie" are available at the Student Activities Center. Admission is \$3.50 general, \$2.50 for students with their CCC student body card and \$1.50 for children under 12 when accompanied by an adult. Tickets are also available at the door the night of the performance.
