tion level in a junior college league, so instead of embarrassing the school as they did last year, I decided not to have a team this year and prepare for next year," said Reznevich.

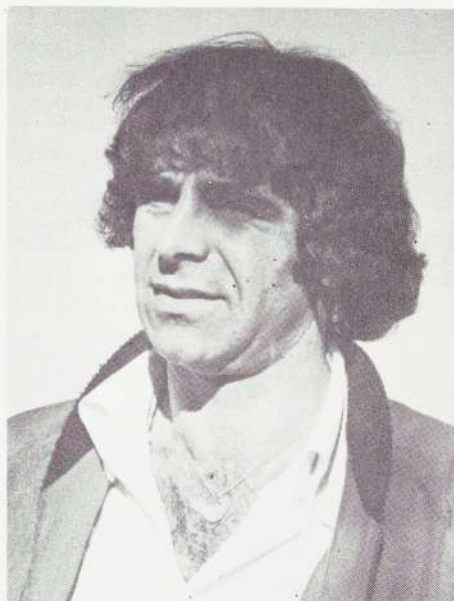
