Human services

Sixteen students were employed last summer through the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) in a series of human services special projects at Clackamas Community College.

One of the projects was to initiate pre-retirement classes. Marsha Marzano and Chuck Floyd, CETA employees, have been using telephone interviews and a county-wide study of human services specialists to prepare and promote the class.

The classes will start October 18 and deal with financial problems and changing life styles of those in retirement.

Also amid the summer projects through human services, was a county-wide study of employment opportunities for those involved in the county program.

"Another project developed last summer was gaining support of an on-campus Handicapped Resource Center on the CCC mall, which, if everything goes according to schedule, should start in January," said Michelle Haynes of the Human Services staff.

Grants, research, proposal writing and consultation with community groups was handled by Gerard Bellavita, grants researcher and writer for Human Services.

Library research for all projects was done by Terry Daniel. Linda Pointer took care of all publicity and Erna Ascott attended to the clerical tasks. Supervision was provided by Jerry Jamison of the human services department, under the direction of Larry Forsythe, department chairperson of human services.
