Holland then made a motion to ban any foreign political matter from being posted on our campus. His motion, if passed, would allow any posters having to do with local, state or national government to be posted.

"We're not talking about handing out pamphlets," said Goede, "that's on a one-to one basis. But with posters you could just have some Nazi go out and print up a bunch of posters...."

The motion did not go to the vote, however, as Roberts, director of student activities requested that it be sent to committee for further study before a decision was made.

"When you make a decision like this it has

to be one I can live with," he said.

A final recommendation will be made by that committee at today's ASG meeting.
