Al levy

Three year rate-based serial will be presented to the board along with a construction bond in May of 1978 if the Board of Education approves the recommendations of the Finance Study Committee. At the Nov. 28 meeting, the Finance Study committee voted to recommend to the Board that a serial levy, which would include requests for both construction and construction bond, be presented to the voters. The rate would be no more than \$1.60 per thousand of valuation.

Members agreed that it would be better to persuade voters to accept a "one shot" funding rather than to request operating funds and then return to the voters for construction money. A presentation will be made to the board at its Dec. 14 meeting by committee chair Dan Faddis.
