## Skill olympics

This is just one participant's reason for wanting to study abroad, but other reasons vary

Year-long academic programs in France, Germany, Japan and Mexico will allow you to earn full Oregon State University or University of Oregon credit while studying abroad. Financial aid is available as well as the opportunity to apply for a scholarship. You must have two years of language study to qualify for programs in France, Germany and Mexico. There is no language prerequisite for the Japanese program.
