Board agenda

A proposal for a total enrollment management program will be discussed during tonight's College board of education meeting.

Other topics for discussion will be the funding of the College's adult education programs (ABE/GED) and approval of a summer four-day work week for all College employees whose areas of responsibility are compatible with a four-day work week.

A recommendation to purchase additional electric doors for the College will be decided. The additional door would comply with federal code 504, a non-discriminatory regulation which lists projects each institution must have completed by a pre-designated time.

Dinner will be held at 6 p.m. in the College's Small Dining Room to discuss our financial status and enrollment projections. The regular meeting will begin at 8:30 p.m. in the Barlow Board Room.

Vipers exhibited

When the topic of snakes comes up, most people will refrain from any further discussion feeling that snakes are a disagreeable reptile. Yet, snake venom serves a useful medicinal purpose in laboratories today.

Darwin Vest, director of the Venomatrium Research Laboratories in Moscow, Idaho, will be at the College April 18 to give a visual presentation of the reptiles to all interested individuals.

Topics to be discussed during the presentation will mainly em-

phasize snake related information such as venom research, its practicality and potential usefulness in the medical field.

Every year, Vest tours the western schools with his reptile display. This is the first time he will be at the College.

After the live presentation, Vest will then give a presentation to the biology majors and nursing students in the Orchard Center.

The one hour presentation on Tuesday will be in the McLoughlin Hall Theatre from noon to 1 p.m. Everyone is encouraged to attend.

Election results

The official tally from the Clackamas County elections office indicated that the College's April 4 bid for a three-year rate-based serial levy passed by a total of 842 votes. There were 8,205 votes in favor of the levy and 7,363 no votes.

This year's levy also included a provision for building funds and passage of it means that the college will be able to begin construction on the much-needed facilities.

According to John Hakanson, College president, construction on a new science facility should begin in August of this year.

County crisis line ties up June opening

Network, Inc., Clackamas County's only crisis line, will become a reality June 1, according to Jim Phillips, director.

"I found that when I moved here from Detroit, Mich., I became aware of related resources of need in the county," he said. "I found that all were met except for availability of a crisis line."

The crisis line, an entity of Community Action, will serve as a counseling hot-line and support system for individuals facing an emotional crisis.

"We would anticipate suicide calls, drug abuse calls, alcohol-related calls and even general question calls," he said.

Phillips is now working on soliciting volunteers to man the crisis line which will operate from

8:30 a.m. to 2 a.m. daily.

"We are looking at four shifts of four volunteers per seven days a week," Phillips said. "If we have enough volunteers then one person would only have to work four hours per week."

Volunteers are required to be 18 years old and have the ability to help other people to help themselves, he said.

"Individuals will have 20 hours of classroom training and projected training dates fall in the month of May," he said. "We are looking for a six-month commitment and someone who will be through the training period."

Although volunteers are not paid a salary, gasoline costs will be reimbursed. Materials and office costs are assumed by Community Action, Phillips said.

The crisis line's clients will mostly be residents of Clackamas County. The outlying counties all have forms of crisis line referral systems, he said.

"We are aware of multiple resources in the tri-county area," Phillips said. "But the resource is initially that person at the other end of the telephone line."

Burning season

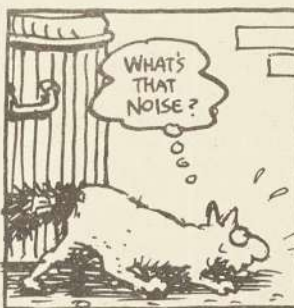
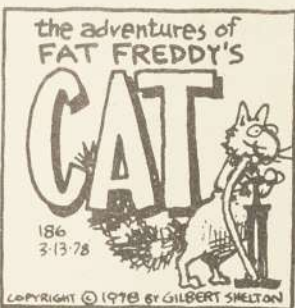
