Women take meet

The women's track team stomped their opponents at the Blue Mountain meet in Pendleton last weekend with 200 points, 122 points ahead of their nearest competitor.

Lisa O'Dea added points to the team effort with her win in the 400 meters at 58.0, the long jump with a 17.3, and her laps in the winning 400 and 1600 relays.

O'Dea shared the Athlete-of-the-Week with Karen Iiams who qualified for Nationals with a put of 40-5½.

In both the 400-meter relay and the 1600-meter relay Clackamas fielded an "A" and "B" team. Taking first in the 400 was the team of Regina Jordan, O'Dea, Amanda Eggleston, and Raela Rodgers. The "B" team consisted of Barbara Rost, Cindy Hadfield, Verna Simon, and Barbara Young. They were timed at 54.8.

"Both 1600-meter relay team broke the school record," head coach Roger Smith said. "The second team was only one-tenth off the National qualifying time for that event."

The team of O'Dea, Jordan, Young, and Eggleston took first in the 1600 with a 4:06.11 while the "B" team of Simon, Angella Cotton, Rodgers and Sally Arthur took second in

4:11.26.

Rodgers set what could be a national junior college record in the 100 meters running an 11.88. Second to her was Jordan with a 12.31 which qualified for the Nationals.

Rodgers also won the 200 meters with Jordan once again second. Their times were 25.98 and 26.61.

Khonda Glietz qualified for Nationals with a 5-3 high jump and Sally Arthur did likewise with a 2:18.9 800-meter run.

Simon took second in the 100-meter hurdles with a 15.93 and managed second in the long jump with Jordan third. Iiams had a fourth in the discuss at 99-11.

In the distance races Clackamas dominated with their depth. Jean Sandwick captured the 3000 in 11:07.0, Vickey Paddock was behind her in second, and Rost was fourth.

Cotton ran a 5:01.63 for second in the 1500-meters. Mary Rasmussen and Paddock followed in third and fourth with Sheryl Thomas sixth.

Sally Arthur took second also in the 800, qualifying for Nationals, and Paddock and Thomas were fifth and sixth.

Barbara Young was second in the 400-meter hurdles at 1:08.06 while Eggleston grabbed the same place in the 400 meters.

Tracksters qualify for Nationals and win

Mark Nugen scored a new personal best of 6272 points in the decathlon and re-qualified for the Nationals with that mark. Nugen also scored PR's in the long jump with a 20-4 leap, and 171-9 in the javelin.

Doug Oberst missed the National qualifying mark but managed to win the 3000-meter steeplechase in 9:45.0. This meet marked Oberst's first race in 2½ weeks.

Preston Martin again bettered his previous personal record in the high jump with a 6-4 leap. Martin barely missed at 6-6, grazing the bar just enough to knock it down.

Dan Jackson threw the discus 148-11 to take the competition while Randy Bolliger bested in

that event with a 129-1. Bolliger won the shot put, his specialty, with 50-9½.

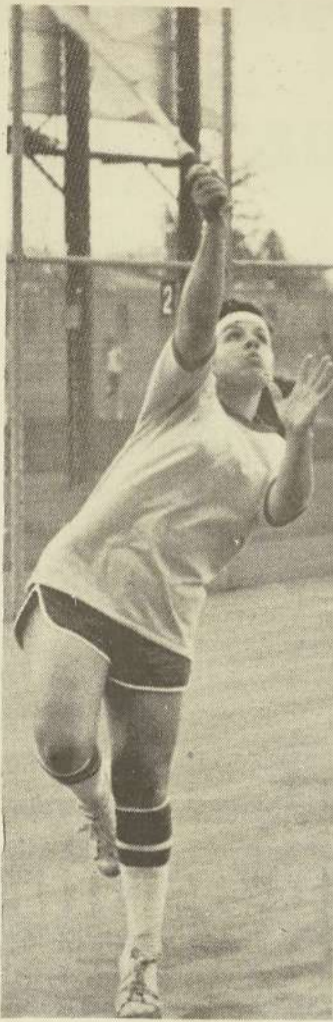
"Dave Rudishauser won the 400 meters in 50.9. It was a very good run for him and a personal best," Tipton said. "Dave also had an outstanding run in the winning mile relay team."

The mile relay team of Joseph Jones, Don Brown, Rudishauser, and Kelly Britz blazed their way to a 3:23.8 finish.

"The track was hard and stiff, so rather than punishing the runners, I had them compete in fewer events than they normally would. We're just practicing for the end of the season now," Tipton said.
