men's and women's track competed in the Mt. Hood weekend and together they face the Linfield Southwestern Oregon Community College and Blue Community College.

Five school records were set by the women and one especially outstanding performance was given by the men.

The team of Regina Jordon, Amanda Eggleston, Raela Rodgers, and Lisa O'Dea took first with a 1:48.25. The men could muster only sixth place in that event.

In the 400-meter relay Jordon, Young, Eggleston, and Rodgers, and O'Dea again teamed up for the 4:00.14 1600 race and the 800 record of 1:46.44.

Lisa O'Dea took third in the 100-meter hurdles with a 15.4.

Ronda Glietz earned the only points in the field events with her fifth place tie at 5'. Verna Simon who usually competes along with Glietz was ill and couldn't participate.

The men did little better in the field events. Mike Murphy scored fourth in the javelin with 181-2 with Mt. Hood's Ron

Munson taking it at 190-2.

Dan Jackson placed fourth in the discus with a 146-5½ toss and sixth in the shot at 45-53/4. Dave Reed was the only other point-getter with his triple jump mark of 43-9¾ for fourth.

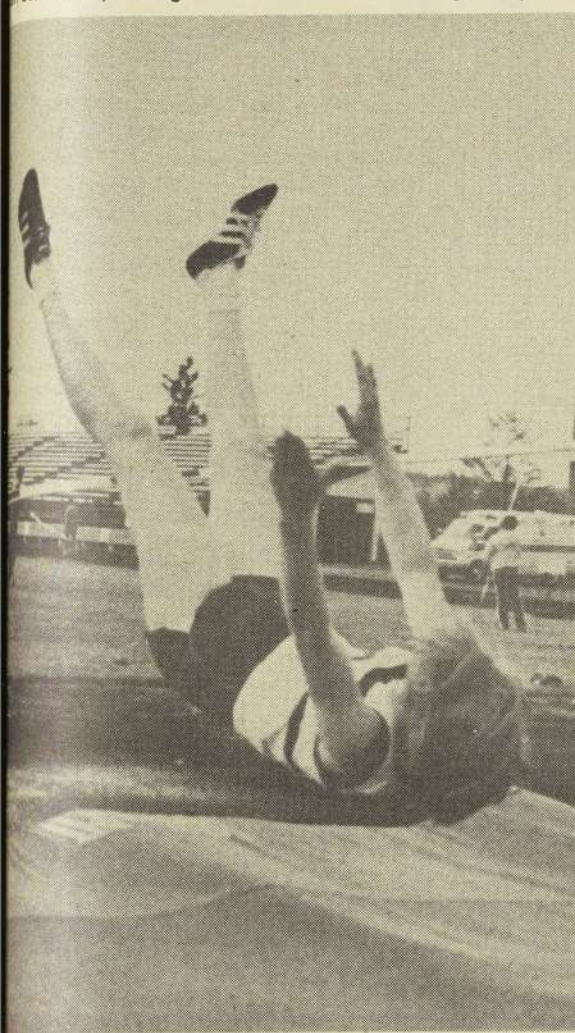
"It was a cold meet, but not too bad," Tipton said. "We were treated considerably but were positioned last in all events. For instance, in the running events we drew the seventh lane and in the field events the last flight and last man."

"I think that the 3200-meter relay did a good job but the 1600-meter relay ran a bit below their capabilities," Tipton said.

The 3200 team consisted of Tom Winters, Dave Rudihauser, Don Brown, and Kelly Britz. They placed fifth with a 7:48.36 while the 1600-meter team took sixth. Joe Jones, Rudihauser, Brown, and Britz turned in a 3:24.56.

The final event for the men was the 6400-meter relay. The team of Wanvig, Mark Nugen, Eric Hulstrom, and Oberst ran a 18:25.18 for sixth.

"We did a good job," Tipton said. "We haven't had our excellent meet yet. That's what we're waiting for."
