Runners eye state men's track

With the state meet looming large this weekend, the Clackamas men's track team squeezed in two meets last week in preparation.

The men travelled all the way to Roseburg on Saturday to face Southwestern Oregon and Blue Mt. Community Colleges. On Wednesday they competed in the Linfield Invitational.

"One of the best things that came out of the Meet at SWOCC was Dave Reed's 46-1 triple jump," Les Tipton, head men's coach said. "It was really great he had three jumps over 45."

"I just needed something to get me going," Reed said. "I guess this was it."

Mike Murphy led the javelin competition at 194-5 with Curt Lowery right behind him with 177-11, Lowery did have some scratches at over 200.

Due to a couple of weak laps Doug Oberst missed the National qualifying standard by five seconds. Oberst took first in the 5000 meters with a 15:05.7 while Eric Holstrom was third with 16:47.3.

Dan Jackson recorded an improvement of almost two feet in the shot put with a 47-2 mark but Randy Bolliger won the event with a 51-1½. In the discus Jackson threw a 150-7 for first and Mark Nugen was fourth.

Joseph Jones also showed better form in his specialty, the long jump. Jones won it with 21-5 ¾ and also won the 100-meter dash at 11.0.

In other dash action Ed McAllistar led the 400 meters with 52.9 while Keith Self came in at 55.1. McAllistar also ran a 23.9 for second in the 200 meters.

The distance races proved prosperous for the Cougars with Kelly Britz leading Dave Rudishauser and Tom Winter to second and fourth places. Britz ran a 1:55.4 with Rudishauser in at 1:55.9.

Don Brown won the 1500 meters in 4:02.8 and Ken Wanvig took third at 4:10.2.

"Preston Martin won the high jump at 6-2 which was just kind of a run through for him," Tipton said. Dave Grosnickel was third in that event and won the pole vault while Nugen managed a third.

"We only took seven people to the meet," Roger Smith, head women's coach said. "We didn't

take any of our sprinters and the people we did take were only taken for the opportunity to qualify for Nationals."

"We still have a couple of people to qualify by Nationals time. I expect Sheryl Thomas, Mary Rasmussen, Karen Iiams, Verna Simon, and Barbara Rost all to qualify."

Rost received the Athlete-of-Meet award but did not qualify for the Nationals in the 1500 meters. Rost led a four place sweep by Clackamas with a 5:06. Thomas was second, Rasmussen third, and Jean Sandwick fourth.

"In the distances we're in pretty good shape for State except for Lisa Nickel. She has an inflammation of the lower calve muscle. She has already qualified for Nationals and she might be ready to run this week."

Iiams placed in both the shot put, discus, and javelin with respective throws of 37-5, 92-11, and 83-3. Simon and Young took places in the long and high jumps with leaps of 16-9½ and 4-11.

Thomas was the lone Cougar entrant in the 800-meter run and she placed second behind Blue Mt.'s Loa Mosby. In a one-two combo Sandwick and Rost ran 11:38.9 and 11:41.3.

Simon and Cindy Hadfield took second and third also be-

hind Mosby in the 200 meters. Hadfield took the 100-meter dash in 14.5. Hurdler Barbara Young was all alone in the 400-meter hurdles with first in 69.5.

"I really think we're coming along well," Smith said. We're getting ready to go after the State, Regional, and National titles. We think we're the team to beat but Central Oregon does have a fine team. Also some of the other schools have good individual competitors."
