ge turnout for ASG elections

Two presidential candidates face runoff battle

turnout of 386 voters failed to elect a new ASG president in last week's elections. Though Mike McCarty, incumbent candidate, received a majority vote of 172 over Richard Weiss's 167 and Randal Harlan's 96, he failed to win the 50 percent plurality needed to win that plurality. McCarty needed only 13 more votes to win that plurality. The campaign intensity between the two runoff candidates, McCarty and Weiss, is rising as they prepare themselves for this week's election that will finally determine next year's president.

"My campaigning this week is more positive," said McCarty. "I'm going around and talking to people, like the nursing students and the law enforcement people. Some of the people in the office are taking over some of my work which is freeing me to spend more time to actively campaign than I had last week."

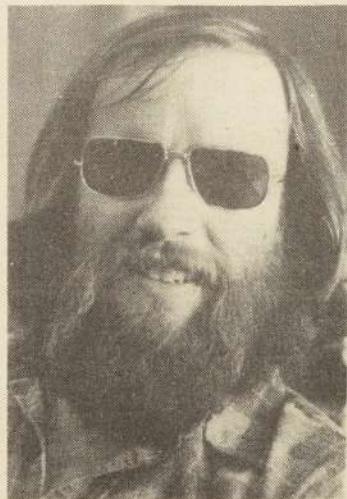
Weiss too, is adding new facets to his campaign strategy. "I think last week's election came off rather well," he said. "It shows that a one-to-one, personal type of campaign is more effective for the effort put forth than a media campaign. This time I'll probably put up posters and things for name familiarity. There is a need for the media in getting this kind of familiarity," he said. Both candidates feel the runoff election is good both for

them and for encouraging student involvement, and both credited the media in part for stirring up student interest. "It gives us both more exposure and is drawing more student interest," McCarty said. There was more publicity and more visualization than there was last year," McCarty. "The paper (The Print) did a very adequate job of covering the election." "There was a lot of controversy over the newspaper art-

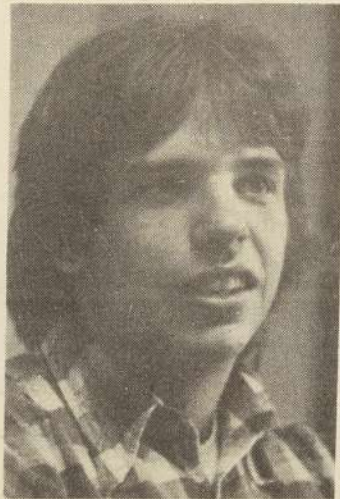
icle endorsing the candidates," Weiss said, "it was talked about a lot." Dave Riggs will be next year's ASG vice president. He received 153 votes, Denise Klein, 96 and John Harlan, 84 votes. Jo Ann McCauley ran for the office of secretary unopposed and received 292 votes. Sherrie Montgomery was the victor in the race for business manager with 197 votes to Maureen Kearney's 126.
