

# ELC reaps profit growth from benefit plant sale

Despite inclement weather, scores of plant lovers turned out last Friday and Saturday to take advantage of prices that are 30 to 100 percent lower than what a nursery would normally charge, according to Jerry Herrmann of the John Inskeep Environmental Learning Center.

"They stole all our plants," Herrmann said. "This year's sale is the best yet. Last year we only sold about \$600 worth of plants as compared to \$1,350 for our recent sale which will leave about \$1,000 profit to be

used in construction of the pavillion."

Construction on the pavillion, which will begin soon, is funded primarily by public donations from various businesses in the area, concerned individuals and this plant sale.

"This building will be used both by the College and the public for art shows and ecology displays and seminars."

"Mainly it will be used as an environmental resource center so we disseminate needed information say, on solar heating or

windmills to the public," Herrmann said.

The fantastic plant sale, which was to end Saturday will continue through tomorrow.

"The reason we are doing this is to give people who missed the sale because of the rain or the holiday extra time to purchase plants they may have wanted," he said.

"This also gives us a chance to clean out all our older nursery stock and make room for any new plants that may be coming in," Herrmann said.
