"I want our student body to be well represented so I want the ASG to be sure and know what the people want."

and has attended Clackamas for six terms. She wants to have a more direct contact with the various projects going on, not only at Clackamas, but on the county level as well. "I want to open communications between the students and the student government at Clackamas," said Lally.

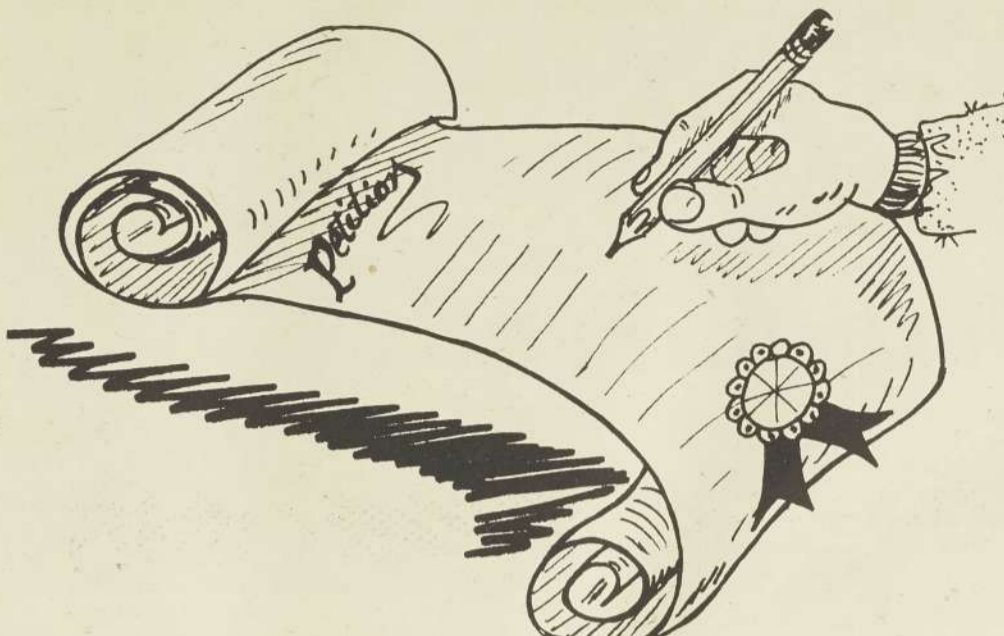
Richard Weiss was involved in student government last year. He is an electronics major and is interested in ob-
