## Officer helps fund raisers

"I am a strong advocate of team work. My philosophy is a hands down approach," said Bill Anton, College developmental officer.

Anton's position is a new one at the college. Basically what he does is help groups with fund raising projects, follow-ups on grants, communication with private foundations, endowments, and speaks before groups helping them decide the best way to raise money and spend it.

"It's a new position to the community colleges but not to the four-year institutes," Anton said. "Student enrollment is down and competition in the academic 'market place' is high."

"We needed someone to help us compete, that's where the position of Developmental Officer came in," he said.

Anton is very excited and enthusiastic about his job, and at the moment thinks things are going "very well."

Anton's background includes an Associate Arts degree, bachelor's degree in science, master's in human communication, marketing, managing and politics.

"I'm very excited about this," Anton said, "exciting things can happen if everyone works together; but it can't be done alone."

One of Anton's first

cooperative fund-raising effort is the college rummage sale for Nov. 17-19 in the Community Center.

The sale is being billed "Ausverkaut," German for "sale," and is expected to generate from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The Association of Student Government and College Foundation will use the sale proceeds.

A truckload of merchandise from Fred Meyer, Inc., a rabbit and birdhouse from Environmental Learning Center and a big-as-life heater among the items that will be sold during the Ausverkaut. Tapestries, antique glassware, silverware, clothing and other items are also to be included in the sale. Gary Michaels, tennis coach and physical education instructor was the first faculty member to contribute to the sale.

Anton said students, staff and community members may contribute to the sale by donating their saleable items to the Student Government office in the Community Center.

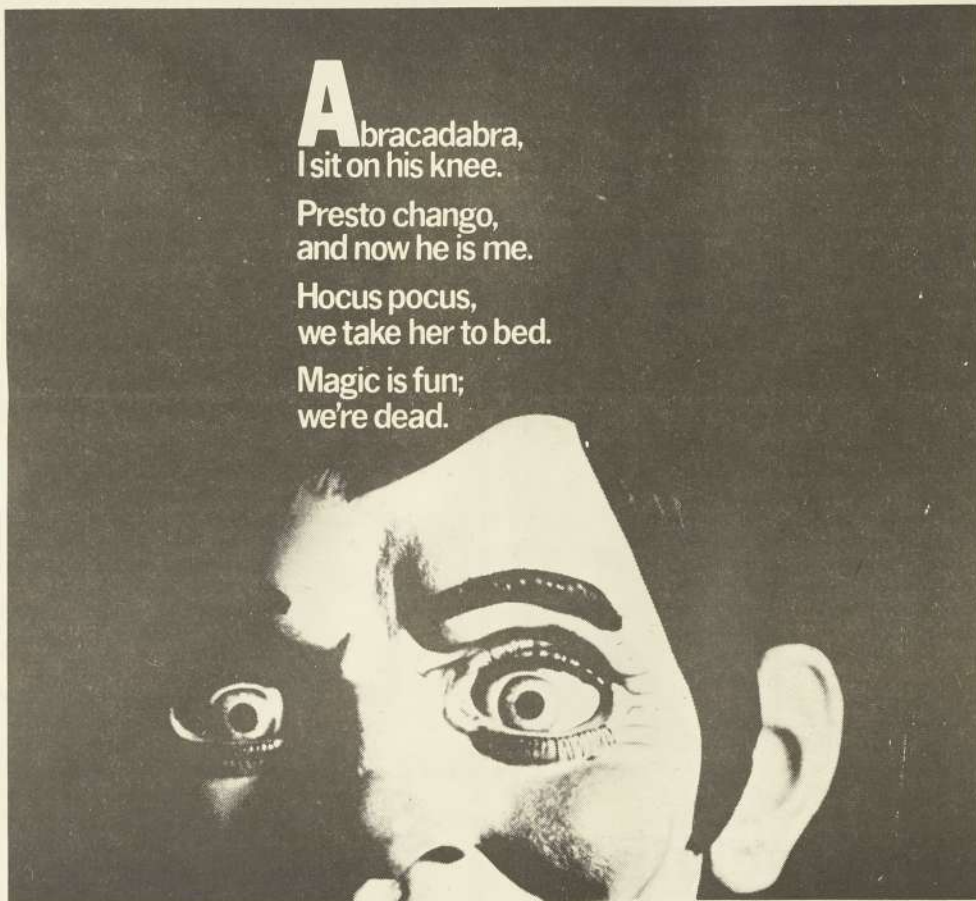
