Eclipse class

The College science department will offer a one-credit course titled "Science Eclipse Observation" winter quarter, taught by Mike Aronson, physics instructor.

The class will travel to a site in Eastern Oregon to make spectrograms of the solar corona and possibly the chromosphere during the total solar eclipse on Feb. 26, 1979.

"The last total solar eclipse visible in Portland was in 1918. One of my present students saw it when she was 14 years old," Aronson said.

Photographs and possibly movies of the eclipse will be taken during the more than two minutes of totality. The experiments will be evaluated and the results submitted to the U.S. Naval Observation in Washington, D.C.

"This is the last total solar eclipse visible from North America in this century," Aronson said.
