Portland's best known folk group, Howling Gael, will perform in concert with two very accomplished west coast folk groups, No Comhaile, (no come all yuh), from Seattle, and Knock Na Shee, from San Francisco, Friday at 8 p.m. in the Portland Art Museum's Swann Auditorium located at 1219 S.W. Park.

Howling Gael's first album, "Rant and Roar," released in mid-1978, is already passing sales marks that are phenomenal for a local production. The group's strong vocal arrangements and unique instrumentation using guitar, fiddle, hammer dulcimer, mandolin, electric bass and accom-

dion, has been delighting listeners in the Pacific Northwest for the past two and one half years.

No Comhaile, whose members are among the leading exponents of Irish music on the

west coast, bring their own unique interpretations to their increasingly popular form of music, on guitar, tin whistle, fiddle and concertina.

guests from San Francisco, are by all accounts one of the hottest Irish style bands on the west coast. The trio perform on fiddle, guitar and flute.
