For the first time, American culptor Nevelson has allowed erself to be filmed while reating two major new sculp-ures. The film also shows shotographs of the young

evelson and of many pieces, oth early and recent, as well presents voice-over s presents voice-over arration by Nevelson herself which reveals the outspoken, et reserved artist and the evelopment of her work.

Nevelson says of her life: "I'd her work 24 hours in my tudio, and then fall down on hebed than do anything I know. This is living . on her work: " . . . a feast for muself.

Arnold Glismacher, president of New York's Pace Gallery, calls Nevelson "an architect of light and shadow.'

Critic Cindy Nemser says she has "taken this chaotic world and restructured it-given it an order.

Alice Neel has been called "a painter of people." Her por-traits concentrate on the unpleasant aspects of the human predicament-they are

revealing, disturbing, often shocking, but not caricatural of cruel. She has been related stylistically to the great ex-pressionist work of Van Gogh, Ensor, Grosz, and Bacon.

This film presents a portrait of the forthright artist and her many works. Highlights include

reception at New York's Graham Gallery where people are seen next to their portraits,
