Positions open

A special sections section lists 145 news newsletters and other publications arranged by: local interests, government, human services, business-industry-farm labor, environment, public affairs, arts, the arts, women and

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men, seniors, church and Indian press in Oregon.

Insurance

Four accident and sickness insurance plans are available to College students until Friday, the deadline for purchasing the policies.

The options include "school-time only" accident coverage, recommended for high-risk occupational students and those involved in sports activity classes. Cost is \$6 per term.

A second plan offers 24-hour coverage for accidents. Cost is \$13 per term.

Basic Plan A offers low-budget coverage for illness, hospitalization and accidents. Cost is \$16.65 per term.

Basic Plan B provides twice the dollar coverage of Plan A for \$33.35 per term. It also includes a major medical coverage for catastrophic conditions when a person pays a \$100 deductible amount.

Plans A and B are available to all students aged 19 and younger.
