Four accident and sickness insurance plans are available to College students until Friday, the deadline for purchasing the

The options include "schooltime only" accident coverage, recommended for high-risk occupational students and those involved in sports activity classes. Cost is \$6 per term.

A second plan offers 24hour coverage for accidents. Cost is \$13 per term.

Basic Plan A offers lowbudget coverage for illness, hospitalization and accidents. Cost is \$16.65 per term.

Basic Plan B provides twice the dollar coverage of Plan A for \$33.35 per term. It also includes a major coverage for catastrophic conditions when a person pays a \$100 deductible amount.

Plans A and B are available to all students aged 39 and younger.
