Taylor added, "I think Tim Qualls is better than the number three player who won it last year and Dave Long plays the type of game that could win some matches. And with Steve Anast, it just depends on the draw. Rick Bobzien could do well at number four,"Taylor added.

In retracing CCC's qualifying for the national tournament, first there was the capturing of the OCCAA league title. Next, it was the cake walk at the state tournament, which saw CCC players win first place individual state titles at all four singles slots along with capturing one of the two doubles

But it was not as easy at the regional tournament in Salem, where the Cougs found themselves in what turned out to be a two-horse race with a tough team from Treasure Valley.

At the end of the first day of competition, the Cougs trailed Treasure Valley by two points, which could have been due to the fact that they did not receive the most admirable seeds. "We didn't get the good

> As the second and final day of competition opened, CCC players had their backs to the wall to some extent, but responded well under the pressure. "We had been looking for the opportunity to play Treasure Valley," said Taylor. "We played eight matches with them (Treasure Valley), and won five," which ultimately preserved the win for the Cougs as the two teams ended the tourney in a virtual Due to the fact that Clackamas had the edge on head-to-head victories, they received the title.

Individually, for the Cougar racquetmen, Steve Anast finished second to Treasure Valley's Mark Gustus at the number one singles position. Dave Long continued his wining ways, capturing what Coach Taylor called a "pivotal match" over Treasure Valley's Mike Swope, 6-4, 4-6, 6-4. Ever consistent Tim Qualls baffled tournament opponents enroute to the title at the number three singles position.

Rick Bobzien, who has played extremely well down the stretch, captured the number four singles along with gaining another title on the second doubles team where he was partnered with Alan Clevinger.

The title turned out to be extremely important as they eliminated the Treasure Valley team in the semi-finals before
