## Women rights

Knowing your personal rights and using them to protect yourself and property is the subject of "Legal Rights of Women", a Focus on Women seminar, at the College, Thursday, May 31, in the Community Center, room 117, at 7 p.m.

## Funds available

"I would like to encourage anyone who even remotely feels that they will need money next year to apply for financial aid," said Dick Thompson, College financial aid officer.

"All it takes is a little time and a couple dollars for processing," he said. "The returns on that could be in the hundreds of dollars."

Increased chances that College students can receive financial aid for the 1979-80 school year, have been made possible due to the Middle Income Assistance Act, Thompson said. Brought into existence last winter and due to take effect fall term, the act will account for a "liberalization of aid ceilings for both dependent and independent students," said Thompson.

"Because of this, a student can be making over \$3,000 and have a home equity of

\$10,000 and still qualify for the maximum Basic Opportunity Grant," he said. "A student can make more, and still qualify for some aid."

For students who have neglected to apply for next year's aid, there is still time, and the financial aid office is ready and willing to help anyone confused by detailed forms or the red tape,

sometimes encountered from the BEOG (Basic Educational Opportunity Grant) computer. 1979-80 financial aid handbooks are also available at the financial aid office, as reference to the interested student.

## Cabinet honored

An open house will be held in the financial aid office Friday, to honor the College cabinet make, Leonard Chapin.

Described as a "super craftsman" by Dick Thompson, financial aid officer, Chapin is responsible for much of the cabinet work in the student activities, financial aid and placement center offices, along with numerous other projects around campus.
