## Bad Company sings with heavenly voices

Bad Company's newest album on Swan Song Records is titled "Desolation Angels," but if Bad Company continues to release mediocre albums like this one, they'll soon be on desolation row wondering why the rock critics haven't like a record of their since their debut album, "Bad Company," released in 1972.

Back in '72, the group sounded fresh and exciting with an all-star line-up featuring vocalist Paul Rodgers and drummer Simon Kirke, from the British blues-rock band, Free; lead guitarist Mike Ralphs, from Mott the Hoople; and Boz Burrell on

bass. Since their first album, which included the classic macho-rocker, "Can't Get Enough," the group has failed to create anything that resembles their initial energy.

"Desolation Angels" has a bit more depth than their last album, "Burning Sky," and Rodgers' pounding anguish-filled vocals still appear in spots, but for over a year's work, the final product leaves much to be desired.

Many of the songs, like "Lonely for Your Love," and "She Brings Me Love," show that Bad Company has fallen into a rut. They just have not progressed that much in their seven years of existence.

The best song on the album is their hit single,

"Rock and Roll Fantasy," which is a hot rocker in the old Bad Company tradition with snapping guitar lines by Ralphs, Rodgers' gutsy vocals and the hammering rhythm section of Kirke and Burrell.

The decision to use "Rock and Roll Fantasy" as the single release off of the album shows cunning deception on Bad Company's part, as it proves to be an excellent facade for an otherwise weak album.

Despite the newest Bad Company disappointment, I haven't given up hope yet. I know somewhere deep down inside, they still have it in them to make another album of hard driving rock and roll, but just don't ask me when. I've been waiting long enough as it is.
