Foreign student enrollment at the College averages about 27 students, according to counselor Vince Fitzgerald. Fitzgerald said a few students usually have prearranged a

living arrangement with a family before arriving in U.S. "Another four or five want a family to live with the start," he said. "Or sooner they experience apartment living, they recognize the benefit of learning U.S. customs and language from a close family association."

Fitzgerald said a young woman from Hong Kong is currently looking for a family to live with during the academic year.

The College is also looking for a family who would be interested and willing to coordinate the placing of foreign students in American homes as the need arises.

"Families interested in participating as volunteers to host a family to live with them, or to simply share a holiday dinner or celebration please also call," said Fitzgerald.
