

# Survey finds the three most well known college students

A survey of students registering for spring term at the College, conducted by Dick Thompson, financial aid officer, turned up some interesting facts about the average student.

The survey outlined three different types of students: single living at home, single living away from home, and the married or single parent household. Each student type has its own characteristic lifestyle, and financial pattern, said Thompson.

According to the survey, the "typical" student who lives at home has never married and lives in a family of three to four people. The student pays less than \$100 a month for living at home, does not qualify for

food stamps and spends less than \$50 per month for all food costs. The typical student drives a car approximately 8.5 miles to school one way. He or she spends about \$200. He or she says about \$200 a month is needed to meet minimum living expenses.

For the "typical" single student attending the College, who is living away from home, survey results show that he or she has never been married, has an equal chance to live alone or with a roommate, and is paying about \$137.50 per month for rented housing. Winter electricity and/or heating costs are about \$50 per month.

Probably, he or she does not qualify for food stamps and spends \$112.50 per month for food and household supplies.

Like the student living at home, this student drives a car an average of 8.5 miles to school each day. The typical student living away from home claims that he or she needs \$450 to meet minimum living expenses each month.

Survey results show that the "typical" non-single student household is composed of a married couple and one or two children. The family is purchasing a home about 12.5 miles from campus and is paying over \$200 per month for mortgage payments. The family does not qualify for food stamps and spends slightly over \$200 for food each month. Winter electricity and heating costs total about \$70 per month. This household needs over \$700 per month to meet minimum family expenses.
