School population increases this year

Despite the rising tuition and book costs and the fear of a recession, enrollment at the College jumped a surprising 16 percent over last year at this time, according to registration figures.

The equivalent of 1,598 students registered for 12 credit hours or more for the fall term compared to a 1,341 full-time equivalent last fall. Two possible reasons for the jump in the figures are either the fact that students registered earlier or more students registered, or both.

Many of the total 4,847 registering were younger students. A reported 2,190 registered were 25 or younger, while 2,788 were 26 or over.

A jump that large in enrollment came as a surprise to director of enrollment, Charles Adams. However, this College isn't the only College to have an increase in enrollment. "Most of the community college enrollments along the Willamette Valley are going up in F.T.E." Adams said.
