## College deans appointed

Bob Ellis and Bill Hargadine were appointed associate deans at the Oct. 10 College Board of Trustees meeting, with Ellis in charge of community education and Hargadine overseeing community services.

Ellis and Hargadine will split the administrative duties formerly handled by Marv Weiss, who resigned as dean of community education and community services in September to become president of a community college in Colorado.

Hargadine came to the College in 1969 after teaching Oregon high schools for 12 years. As a member of the faculty he taught social sciences, U.S. History and coached football and soccer.

In 1976 he became coordinator of community services which has grown to include college development (surveying needs and obtaining grants and gifts to fulfill them); Monday College and Focus on Women. He also has had the responsibility for scheduling school and community use of the College recreational

facilities.

Hargadine graduated from Portland State University and holds a master's degree in education from Oregon State University.

Ellis has been an educator since 1962, starting as a high school teacher of science and social sciences. He came to Clackamas Community College from Estacada in 1973, where he had been teaching, counseling, and coaching youth. He was also active in community affairs, and for three years served as director of the first community school in Oregon.

In serving at the College as coordinator of community education, Ellis became the first to develop such a program within a community college. This program now includes more than 600 classes directly associated with the College and approximately 800 more in a well organized network in surrounding areas, according to Ellis.

Community education has grown from a small but firm belief—that education comes in many forms, should be available to all who desire it,

and the school plant and properties truly belong to all people of the district—to a growing, multi-faceted, people-determined network. It is facilitated by coordinators, but run by and for the people of each community, said Ellis.

"The program now includes job skill improvement (which is finding needs, organizing seminars and classes and conducting them on business sites for employees); continuing education which is basically all non-credit classes held in various school sites in the district; and community development, the real babe-in-the-woods," said Ellis. He said the community development program's purpose is to "help people to help themselves" by making use of resources already available or organizing and running those resources as a way of helping themselves and their neighbors.

Ellis holds a master's degree in education from Linfield College and a bachelor's degree from Oregon College of Education.
