The team then traveled to Bend on the following Wednesday only to have their nine-game winning streak cut short by Central Oregon. The Cougars closed the week by downing Lane 15-4, 12-15, 15-9, and losing to Judson Baptist 2-15, 12-15.

In the non-leaguer against Warner Pacific, the Cougs were caught napping as Warner's servers shot over five straight points to start the match in motion. CCC summoned up hidden resources and after

many rotations, the score changed in the Coug's favor 16-14.

Still riding high from the first game win, the Cougs quickly took the lead and never relinquished it, going the distance to clobber Warner 15-4.
