

Salary adjustments board meeting topic

Adjustments in administrative salaries were approved by the College Board of Education during the Nov. 14 meeting of the board. The adjustments represent a two and one-half percent increase in salary. The additional 2.5 percent

boost in administrative salaries was requested so that administrators would receive an increase similar to the salary package approved for the College faculty in late September. The faculty accepted an increase of 10.7 percent.

In other action, the board

approved a request for \$18,000 in planning funds to update the College master plan and develop a schematic plan for the campus mall; authorized staff to advertise for bids on mobile divider curtains for the gymnasium; adopted an updated version of the board

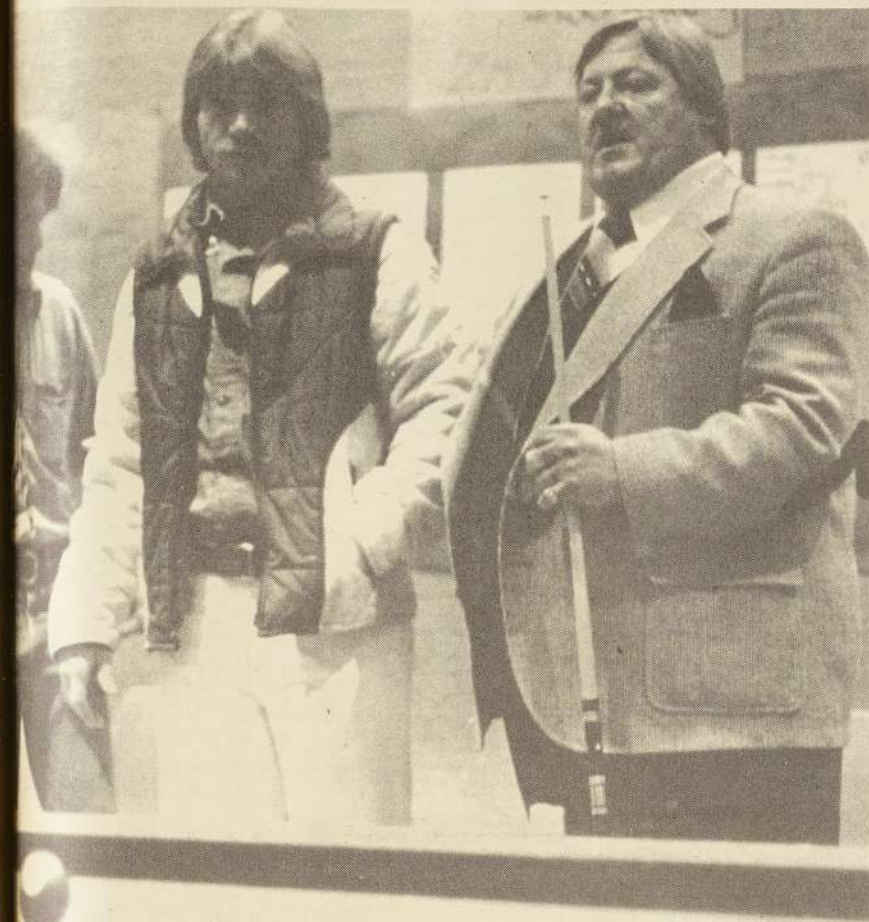
policy manual; and passed a resolution to purchase new equipment for the automotive laboratory.

Citing the need for continual planning, college president, John Hakanson, urged board members to approve the request for planning funds. "I'm in favor of using money for planning," Hakanson noted. "Planning is important to an understanding of the priorities the College will adopt for the coming years."

The board quickly approved the request to advertise for bids on mobile divider curtains for the College gym. Board members noted that increased use of the gym has also increased the possibility of injury. The cur-

tains would be designed to separate activities into specific areas of the gym.

In other business, the board learned that fall term enrollment reflects a 10 to 12 percent increase above the same period last year. Len Monroe, dean of student services, reported that approximately 8,950 students are expected to enroll at the College during the fall term. Reimbursable full-time equivalency, a measure of the number of credit hours for which students enroll, is reported at 1,072 this fall as compared to 960 at the same time in 1978. Three hundred and eighty-two students are currently enrolled in the Saturday College, new this year.
