

Men's and women's programs combine together

The Focus on Women Steering Committee, in collaboration with several representatives from the Men's Resource Program decided, at a noon meeting Thursday, to combine the two community service programs under a "common umbrella."

"In coming together, both committees have chosen to

meet as a singular delegation, that will meet once a month, and will continue to encourage the strong support of the program organizers and instructors," said Carol Layden, coordinator of Focus on Women, and Community Service assistant.

Layden identified the benefits of unifying the programs, but also emphasized each steering committee's

need to maintain a separate identity. "The programs will be united as one, yet the committees have reserved the right to meet alone with their designated members," she said.

Reaching out to all areas of the College as well as a multitude of community organizations, Focus on Women has for five years successfully offered educational

seminars, classes of interest, and other special events, and is now rolling smoothly into its sixth year of operation.

According to Layden, "unique" is the word which most clearly describes Focus on Women. She considers the program unique, because it was started through interested staff, primarily faculty members. Focus on Women's first coordinator was Bernice "Buzz" Evans. Bernie Nolan became its second coordinator.

"Focus on Women is also unique," believes Layden, "because it has a dedicated and involved steering committee, composed of approximately 40 women from the community, student body, faculty and college staff, along with professionalism and devotion of the seminar leaders, all of whom have had a hand in developing a very proficient program."

The Men's Resource Program, which was organized by Vince Fitzgerald, College counselor, at the suggestion of Evans, has also grown rapidly over the years, added Layden.

"Now, as a united team, a program can be offered that will address the needs of men and women," said Layden, a futuristic gleam in her eyes. "The end result will benefit the participants, so they have the advantage of hearing each other and responding. That way, both men and women win."

Also at the meeting it was further discussed and decided that the first area of interest to be approached under the umbrella concept and a possible idea for first seminar, will be a look at the 17 to 25 age group on campus, Layden concluded.

against cystic fibrosis (C.F.), a congenital disease which affects one of every 6,000 children born, and is carried by about one of every 20 people.

to 10 p.m. Monday, Feb. 4 when they will be open from 10:30 - 2.

The club is asking for donations of \$1 or more which will go to the Portland chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, where it will be used for research and financial assistance to families of C.F. victims. In return for their contribution each person will receive a set of three certificates.

The certificates, which look rather like small diplomas, can be filled out and presented to whomever a person desires, be it spouse or sibling, parent or

child, or that someone extra special—a different kind of Valentine.

Information about cystic fibrosis will also be available for those who are interested.
