

Speaker conference highlight

More than 50 photographers, editors and reporters from Clackamas County high schools gathered at the College Thursday for the annual Clackamas Journalism Conference.

The conference offered workshops, displays and round

table discussions to prospective reporters in search of careers in the field of journalism. Speakers talked to students on photography, reporting, interviewing, public relations and what it takes to make an exciting newspaper.

Stephanie Oliver, editor of

Oregon Magazine, spoke on the subject, "What Writing's All About."

Amidst all the workshops and displays, competitions took place for reporters and photographers.

David Long from Clackamas High School took first place in

news reporting. Patrick Mahaffy from West Linn was first in feature writing. Tom Phillipson, also from West Linn, placed first in editorials. Tom Steele from Milwaukie and David Barhoum from Clackamas tied for first in the category of sports writing.

In the field of photography, Kirk Hirota of Oregon City snapped first place in general photography. Hirota also won in the spot news photo, and feature photo categories. In sports photography, Mike Anus from Clackamas took first place.

"The Elevator" from Oregon City High School won the top prize for over-all newspaper. "The Milwaukian" from Milwaukie High School took second, and the "Roamin' Scroll" from Gladstone High School placed third.

Scholarships for 1980-81 were awarded to Mike Rose, Rex Putnam High School; Richard Obritschkewitsch, Rex Putnam; Tom Jeffries, Estacada High School and Linda Cabrera, Canby High School. Susan Coulter, also of Canby, was chosen as an alternate in case one of the recipients is unable to accept the award.

Men give book of faith to students

Don Smith, one of the men who volunteered his time, said, "The book is so true, we want to share our faith with other people."

The Gideons are funded by the International Gideons which originated in Boscobel, Wisc., in 1898.

The men who were on campus were Christian businessmen giving their time to give part of themselves to the public. They are from local

churches and represent a variety of faiths.

The funds to distribute the Bible are made possible by donations from local churches.

The Gideons go to rest homes, hospitals and schools to give their Bibles and faith to others.

The Gideons give away 11 million college testaments in 124 different colleges each year, and one million copies worldwide every 17 days.

The Gideon Bible has been printed in 25 languages, according to the men giving them away here last week.

The speech team will now prepare for the state and regional tournament at Portland Community College May 9 and 10. "It's a good tournament," remarked Harlow. It is the Northwest Junior College Championship, with 12 to 13 two-year colleges from around the Northwest attending.
