Impressed by 'volleyball' serves and her bubbling enthusiasm, Michael says Gaskill "just bounces! I was pleasantly surprised at her adaptation to singles," she ad-ds. "I would really like to have her back next year

LISA LIECHTY-At fourth singles and sharing second doubles with Gaskill, Molalla's Liechty also came into practice wearing a bandage, but nothing holds her back, ac-cording to Michael.
