



Summer courses offer much variety

As College biology students travel about Oregon this summer, theater buffs will learn, first hand, the many aspects involved in the production of a play. The key to these experiences and others is registration in one of the many credit and non-credit courses being offered this summer at the College.

"An intensive summer experience in theater," was how theater director Jack Shields described the course, "Rehearsal and Performance."

Shields' students will design sets and costumes and ultimately perform a play. His plan is that each student emerge from the class with experience in all production aspects of drama.

Biology instructor, Ginny Weber, will take her students outside this summer. The Oregon Coast, Columbia Gorge and Cascades will

provide the backdrop for the summer course, "Field Biology."

A self affirmed hiker, Weber believes that traveling about Oregon will enable students to learn about plant life in different areas and how they relate to each other.

Persons who prefer to remain indoors, however, might consider a course entitled, "Cowboys and Film." Offered for credit in American history, the course features film study of such American classics as "Junior Bonner," "Blazing Saddles," and the "Misfits." Each film is designed to shed a different perspective on the relationship between American history and the interpretation of such through the movies. Summer enrollment expected to be higher, more diverse

Summer enrollment in both credit and non-credit classes at the College is expected to jump between eight and ten percent over last summer's enrollment, according to spokesmen for the College's admissions and community education offices.

"We expect undergraduates from four-year schools who need to fulfill requirements for their degrees to be in attendance," noted Chuck Adams, director of admissions at Clackamas. Course emphasis, however, according to Adams,

will be hard to calculate "because it depends on the mood of the people."

Adams predicted that good weather and summer vacations should draw more interest in "shorter running courses," particularly recreational classes such as tennis and golf.

Lydia Burak, a community education specialist, agreed with Adams that there would probably be a higher emphasis on recreational classes and programs designed for children.

Registration for credit classes begins June 2 and runs through the first week of classes. Classes begin June 16. Persons wishing to enroll in community education classes should note that registration begins on June 9.
