

DeVour reaches for star New sports team Wins first game

The upcoming production of *The Glass Menagerie*, written by Tennessee Williams, is a major American play with a small cast. The four person show includes a young but experienced cast, with one surprise: This is one actress' first show.

Amy DeVour plays Laura, the shy, sensitive daughter on whom the plot hinges. It is considered by some to be one of the most foremost women's roles ever written.

Recently graduated from West Linn High School, DeVour's only previous experience was the drama department. Said DeVour, "We did a lot of skits and improvisations, but this is the first play I've ever been in."

DeVour auditioned for *Menagerie* during the first week on the semester, because of a deep love of acting. When asked if acting was a hobby, or if she'd eventually like to make a profession of it, DeVour said, "I don't know. I think I'd like that, but it's so cut-throat."

"I also want to be a writer. I want to find the one I'm best at," said DeVour, who is on *The Print* staff.

Eventually, DeVour would like to work in any of Portland's community theaters. Said DeVour, "I think I'm pretty good. I'm ambitious enough to

Menagerie plays Dec. 4, 5, 6 and 7, and is directed by Jennie Mahali. Said DeVour, "I think it has the potential to be a successful show. It's a really good cast."

Due to the financial crunch and budget cuts, the College's killer gridiron squad, the Cougar Phantoms, finally opened their 1980 season. What an open! The Cougars smashed perennial power Dodge City, 44-0. Due to the time zones, Coach Dan Redeye Dye was only able to arrange a telephone interview.

Coach Dye was visibly upset at his defensive players who, late in the fourth quarter, allowed the Screaming School Teachers of Dodge City their only first down of the game. Dye labeled the players as lacking intensity and desire. He did single out Bruno (Big Al) Nunzio for outstanding play as the Cougars defensive captain and middle linebacker.

Offensively, the Cougars dominated the School Teachers from the first offensive series. Quarterback Jack Starr was impressive, completing ten of 11 for 250 yards. Fullback Sam Bocheck averaged six yards a carry and gained 115 yards for the evening. Billy Williams scored three touchdowns and gained 175 yards, including a jaunt of 55 yards for six. Leroy (Stretch) Jones caught seven passes including a 70-yd. play-action

pass on the opening play from scrimmage.

Asked about the offensive fireworks, Coach Dye remarked, "I haven't seen the films."

The coach claimed that the Teachers were tough and could have easily turned the game around.

"A fumble here, a first down there, and those Screaming School Teachers could've knocked our socks off!"

Next week, the Cougars tackle a Wyoming powerhouse, the Medicine Bow Roaming Buffaloes (2-0). The game will be played at Little America's Big Sky Stadium, at 7 p.m. No radio coverage.

When asked about the tough defensive-minded Roaming Buffaloes, Coach Dye replied, "We're happy to be on their schedule."
