

Soccer team still undefeated

Cougars clinch division title with win

The Cougar Varsity Soccer team extended their undefeated record to 7-0, and clinched the OISA Southern Division title by beating defending champion, Portland Community College, 2-1, last Saturday.

The game started off with the Cougars keeping the ball on the Portland side of the field, making many attempts to score. On the first opportunity that Portland has on the Clackamas side of the field, they broke through the Cougars defenses to score the first goal of the game.

The Cougars put their first point of the game into the score book, when Mark Gibson passed the ball from the outside to the middle, to Cleve Neyberg to put it in for the score.

Immediately after the Clackamas score, the ball was passed back and forth, up and

The rest of the first half saw many good defensive plays by the Cougars, including a number of Portland scoring attempts stopped by Cougar goalie Rick Zyelinskie.

In the second half, Sean O'Brien was taken out of the game for awhile to give Charlie Park some playing time, to the obvious approval of the Cougar fans.

The final half of the game was a very physical one, with pressures from both sides to score more points.

There was another penalty free kick attempted by Didzun, but this time the Cougar missed.

Zyelinskie made even more game-saving plays in the second half, including a shot which he knocked down and grabbed getting the ball kicked into his face, to keep him down for awhile. Raymond Deiton also took a shot by the legs into his stomach, also keeping him down for awhile.

The Cougars made a very out stretching final attempt to lengthen their lead, when Mark Gibson passed the ball towards the middle, and Neyberg made a diving attempt to put the ball into the net, but missed.

With just a few minutes left in the game, Zyelinskie made another stretching grab to keep the score at 2-1.

Immediately following the games final end, the Cougar players ran over to the bench where they had a PCC varsity soccer T-shirt. Various players yelling "get a match, get a match, burn it, burn it, tear it up, blow our noses in it first," and followed through to burn a hole through the PCC varsity soccer patch which was on the T-shirt.

The Cougar squad has qualified for the playoffs to play the northern division champs, whether or not they win the rest of their regular season games.
