Using the empty room as the foundation for the finished work, the artists will build constructions or envioronments which will alter the viewer's perception of the gallery. Plans are used to varying degrees as the constructions unfold, but the exact appearance of the completed works will not be known until opening night.

The working methods and final products of the artist differ substantially. Teneau and Bourdette intend to make large scale constructions that exist as one unit within their respective galleries.

Two lectures are scheduled to coincide with this exhibition. On Friday, Dec. 5 at 8 p.m., Linda Cathcart director of the Contemporary Arts Museum in Houston, will talk about "in-stallation and environment" art. The lecture, sponsored by the Contemporary Art Council, is free to the public. Bourdette, Savinar, and Teneau will discuss their work on Dec. 10 at 8 p.m.

Having a marsh in the courtyard of a new building is not everyone's idea of good design. But, for Clackamas Community College's new Linus Pauling Science Center, the biological pool is a natural.

Designed by landscape architect, Andy Rice and CCC science department faculty members, the marsh will serve as an "outdoor classroom," according to Chuck Scott, science division chairman.

"Students will be able to observe the natural evolution of a pond into a marsh, with all the trimmings including silt, cattails and other boggy-area materials," Scott said.

He added students and faculty, especially in biology and botany will be responsible for maintaining the marsh and for collecting new plant materials.

The marsh, which is part of the larger \$4 million science building currently under construction, consists of three small pools divided by a series of pedestrian walkways.

"The intention is to develop a fully-functional water ecosystem," said Rice, who is responsible for all college landscaping projects.
