The Clackamas Community College women's basketball team took to their home floor for the last time this season and defeated Umpqua CC, 50-49.

"It was a very key win for us," coach Nancy Mikleton commented as the Cougars came from behind for the win.

Cindy Johnston had a key theft and break away bucket to cut a five point deficit that Umpqua had maintained most of the second half.

The Cougars were led by Mary Christensen, who had her "best game of the season," according to Mikleton, with 20 points on 8 of 10 from the floor and 4 of 4 from the charity stripe, including two freethrows in the final minute which provided the difference. Denise Wheatley contributed 10 points to the winners.

Lynn Dirkey, the number two scorer in the league, was

held to 17 points, well below her season average.

"The girls are starting to peak," explained Coach Mikleton. "We have to win two of our last three games and defeat Blue Mountain CC to make the playoffs."

The Cougars have three games this week on the raod starting in Salem Wednesday night against Chemeketa followed by Friday and Saturday games with Blue Mountain and Mt. Hood CC.


