## Round-ballers win big against Linn-Benton

Saturday night Clackamas' mens team knocked off Linn-Benton Community, 101-72, in a contest that made Coach Royce Kiser very ecstatic.

"We played a good game!" said Kiser. "Not one guy went in there not ready to play. I didn't have to fire the team up at all—they were ready. They have a real competitive spirit," he said.

Adding to the high spirit of the game, was the Baseball team, otherwise known as "Roeder's Marraders." "At least 20 to 25 of them have been going to each of the games. They even go to the away games. We are really getting good crowds." Kiser said.

He also went on to explain that Linn-Benton may have beaten us by one point in the first half, but in the second half we just took off with the game. We played a real good ball game.

"It's a good feeling to have right now. We have lost a few games—not many—but a few and each time we have come back better and stronger."

With two seconds left on the clock and Clackamas' score at 99, Frank Nesbitt went to the free throw line, and downed the two points needed to bring the score over 100.

"The team really wanted to go for 100" Coach Kiser said,

"Those were really pressure shots for Frank, but he's got a good mind for the game. He is a smart player and he pulled it off."

Two of the other key players are Jerry Olsen and Doug Coffman, "I'm lucky to have two players with as much caliber as they have at one time," he added.

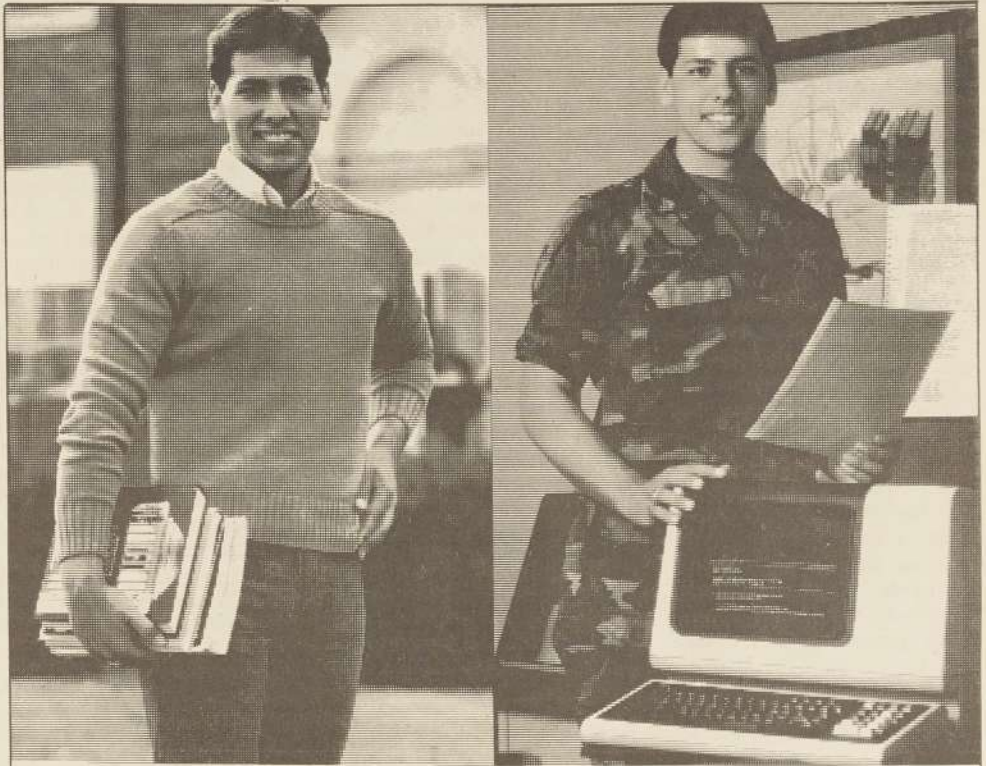
Five members on the team scored in double figures in Saturday night's game. Terry Frison had 18 points and 8 rebounds, Tom Bolt had 17 points with 6 rebounds, Steve Hansen and Terry Newton pumped in 12 points each and Roger Thompson added 11.

"I was glad to see Roger Thompson have a good game after he hurt his thumb. When it got hurt he kind of lost his confidence, and if he gets it back, that is great. We need all of our tough players for the play offs," Kiser stated.

Last Wednesday Clackamas played Lane and lost 69 to 64.

"We were six points ahead with two minutes to go, then some key players fouled out and Lane kind of took control," Kiser said. In that game Terry Frison scored a very high 22 points with nine rebounds, Jeff Richard had 15 points and Terry Newton had 11 points and five rebounds.

Tonight Clackamas plays Portland Community College, says Paul Fiskum, a leading asset to the coaching staff.

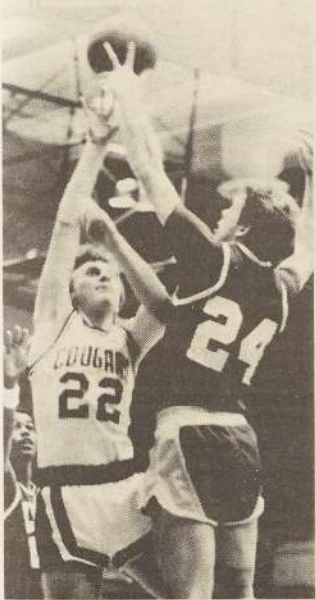
