

Orators capture first place

VanCleave wins trophy

Clackamas Community College's speech team captured both first and second places in Junior Division Expository Speaking at the Lewis & Clark College Forensics Tournament held last weekend, October 11 and 12.

Taking first was Gina VanCleave with her informative speech on crossword puzzles. She said "I did do well because I was prepared; but I still do need to work on it. Hopefully I'll do this well at the next tournament."

Jennifer Hanel placed second with her expository speech on dreams. "I was sur-

All together, there were eight Clackamas students competing in the tournament, including two who teamed up in debate. Eighteen schools were represented at the tournament.

The Lewis & Clark tournament was the first of the speech team's season. Speech Coach Frank Harlow has a positive outlook on this year's competitions. He said among the community colleges, the College should be really strong. Against Anchorage Community College and Clark Community College, it should be a toss-up. The forensics program is open to all of the College's students who are registered for nine or more credits, have been on their high school speech team or have taken SP 111, and whose schedules allow them to compete. Basic categories of speaking are Debate, Impromptu Speaking, Expository Speaking, Interpretation, Dramatic Duo, Extemporaneous Speaking, Oratory, After-Dinner Speaking, Communication Analysis, Dramatic Interpretation, and Readers Theater.

The upcoming University of Oregon speech tournament will bring together 30-35 colleges and universities from around the Northwest. Mr. Harlow believes the team should do well, mostly in expository speaking and oratory. He said the debates will be much stronger, though interpretations will be a toss-up. The U of O tournament will take place this weekend, October 18 and 19.

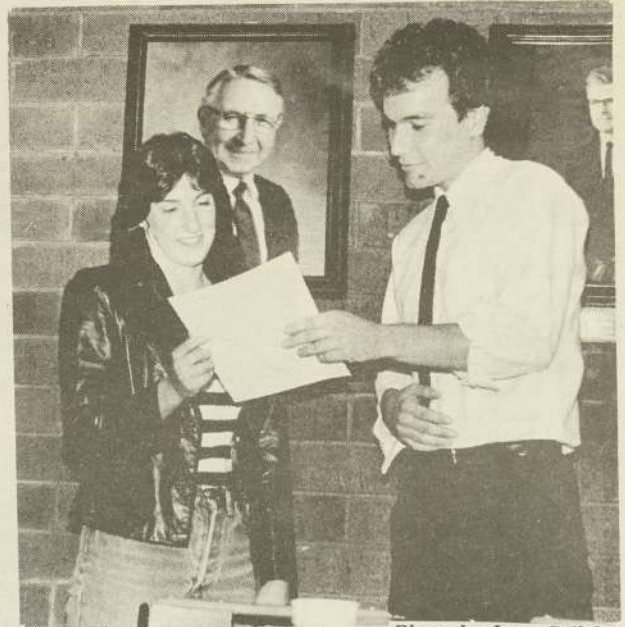

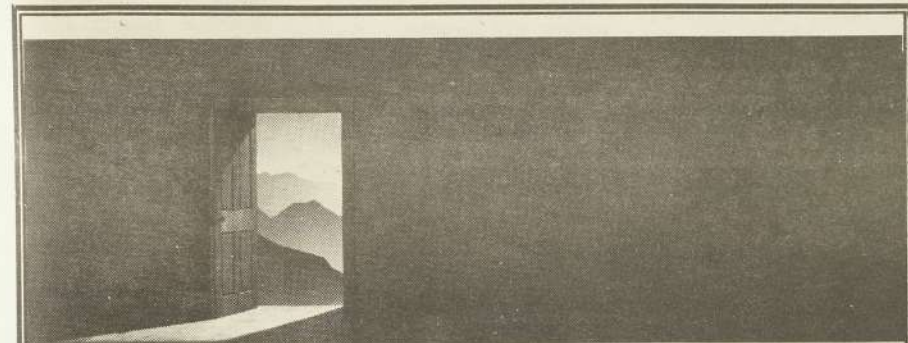
