## Shoreline defeats Cougars, 2-1

Wednesday, Oct. 15, the College's soccer team played what Coach Marty Neshved called a fairly even game against Tacoma Community

College. Clackamas lost the contest in a regulation time decision of 1-2.

The Cougars scored first on a head shot by Kevin Gratiot off a corner kick. According to Coach Neshved, the game was close with no one dominate team, but

Clackamas made mistakes which contributed to their loss. Neshved said that at the end of the first half a Tacoma player that Neshved had marked to be well guarded was left alone long enough to score.

"In the second half we dominated (the game), but we just couldn't put the ball on target," Neshved said.

In action last Saturday,

Clackamas lost a second game to Shoreline Community College by a score of 0-4. The team arrived at Shoreline just a half hour before the game was to start, and Neshved noted that his players seemed stiff and tired. Shoreline dominated the contest with 35 shots on goal, while Clackamas could only manage 6.

At one point in the game, Shoreline took a shot that Zook managed to deflect, but Shoreline intercepted an errant pass and put the ball into the net. Neshved said that Zook

didn't even have time to get back into position after the first attempt. "They got a free goal," Neshved added.

"They attacked and attacked," Neshved said of Shoreline, "Ryan Zook was playing goalie and he had a lot of saves. He has a great head for the position."

Clackamas fared better in

the goal. It deflected off the bar into a convenient group of Shoreline defenders.

According to Neshved, the Cougars would have played a

not Cougar volleyball matches.

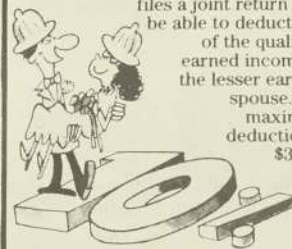
