Like many college student's, entering college is the first step into their future, and a big step at that.

There are those student's who go into their first year set on a particular type of career they want to pursue. Then there are those student's who go through the uncertain struggle of picking a major and career they would like to enter into. Unfortunately these students are not in the minority.

One solution that can help ease the pressure to what might seem like an overwhelming obstacle, is to drop by and visit a place called the Career and Job Development Center.

Almost every school campus has one, but surprisingly, not a great many people know they exist or what the center has to offer.

Joann Truesdell, Career Development Specialist, helped describe some of the

services the center provides.

Helping an individual develop career ideas and assisting with job placement, of which there is three phases is some of the services you can expect from the center.

There is a bulletin board filled with job openings around the area. You can also leave your name, number and the type of work you are looking for and the center will keep you informed if any work in that area shows up.

The center also will help with preparing a resume, and give tips on how to present yourself in an interview.

There are also computers available with listings that cover different career opportunities. The computers can help define a job, list classes needed for that particular job, suggest schools that would be beneficial in order to prepare for this job, and list the type of salary to expect.

If this is not enough, there are books and magazines, that

give out all the information you need to know about a certain job interest.

Truesdell explained that an appointment isn't necessary in order to visit the center. However, appointments are needed if an individual wanted to use one of the computers for a great length of time. Usually this means over 30 minutes.

The center isn't restricted to just student use. The center is open to the public year around as well as to the students.

The Career and Job Developments spring-term hours are as follows: Monday 8 a.m-8 p.m; Tuesday thru Friday 8 a.m-5 p.m..

The Career and Job Development Center is a good step in the right direction for someone who is uncertain about their future. Check it out, you might be surprised.

"We are here to help assist people and help them realize their potential," stressed Truesdell.
