Neil Goldschmidt to speak April 9 in Mall

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Neil Goldschmidt will give a brief presentation and answer audience questions Wednesday in the Community Center Mall at 10 a.m.

Goldschmidt, who has serv-

ed as Mayor of Portland and US Secretary of Transportation, feels that Oregon's state government needs to sort out its priorities for growth and tackle the most pressing items with a concentrated effort.

"Oregon's situation is severe," Goldschmidt said in a January 1986 *Portland Magazine* article. "Our course to restore Oregon's greatness must be charted with some basic principles in mind: We

must know ourselves. We must tend our friendships. And we must keep our list of priorities short."

College president John Keyser, in a March 31 memo to staff members, urged

students and staff to attend the event and said, "I feel it is important that we get the community college message to all gubernatorial candidates at this stage so that they remember us (after the election)."
