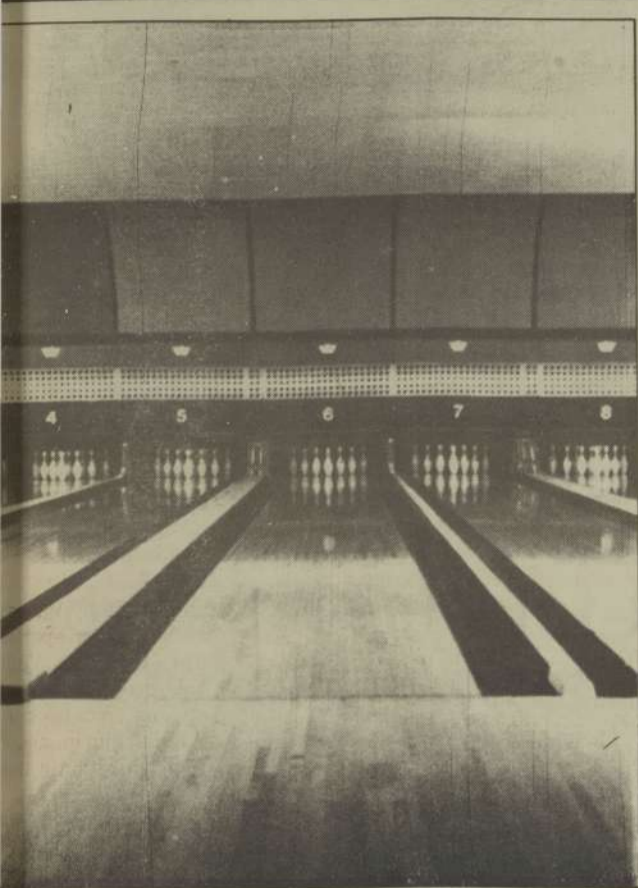

Bowlers start year

There is a list of sports at Clackamas Community College that offers a variety of activities. Included on this list is a very competitive bowling team. Bowling is actually a non-otter sport, but it is registered through Student Activities. The 1986-87 season is only the second season of bowling that the college is experiencing.

The one thing the team needs most of all is more bowlers. In addition to Team Captain Craig Wymore, who is the only returning member of the team there are only six men and three women signed up.

"There have to be more bowlers at Clackamas," said Coach Mick McMahon. "We would like to have at least 12 men (two teams) and six women (one team) to go into the season with."

"Bowling doesn't take up much time," said McMahon. "It won't interfere with school or work." The only stipulation to joining the team is that the person must be a full time student at the college.

Clackamas is entered in the Oregon Collegiate Bowling Conference. Opponents in the conference are Mt. Hood Community College, Oregon State, Portland Community College, Portland State, and University of Oregon.

Last year Clackamas was second to Oregon State in the final conference standings. Clackamas bowled Oregon State for the conference title in Corvallis, but came up short by only 99 points. The final score of the match was 5335 to 5236. Clackamas' highest scorer last year was Marc Slemm, who was also the conference's highest scorer. He had an

average of 22 and conference highs for a series of 755 and for highest game bowled with 216.

Also a strong bowler for Clackamas was Micheal Wright. Last year he had a 187 average, good enough to be fourth in the conference. He also had a game high of 259, which was recorded as third in the conference.

In addition to bowlers, the team needs money. McMahon has estimated that the team will need about \$1500 to get through the season. That includes the price of conference fees, bowling shirts, and expenses for six away matches.

The team had a Bowl-A-Thon to raise some of that money. Since the bowling team is listed as a club with Student Activities, they will receive \$100 from the College. Other than the College's contribution, the players had to find sponsors for the Bowl-A-Thon, which was held on Oct. 21.

Clackamas will play the five other teams in the conference two times each. One time at home and all the others away.

Clackamas Community College cross country team consists of seven men and eight women. The team is coached by a coaching staff of three: Mike Hodges, Jim Kisse, and Marilyn Wynia.

"Both the men and women have had a very competitive season so far and it's very pleasing to have early season success," said coach Hodges. Hodges commended the men saying, "The team is a good group to work with and they do a good job of running together in a pack."

As any other competitive team, Clackamas Community College cross country has set goals for themselves. The Northwest Championship consists of all Community Colleges in Oregon and Washington. Clackamas Community College has a goal of winning the state title and coming back with the Northwest trophy.

There are two major events coming up that the team has been preparing for. This Friday, October 31, they will travel to the state championship with a goal of finishing in the top three. From there, they will go to the Northwest Championship on November 11, with another main goal of placing in the top five.

With seven strong runners, the men have had no losses in the state of Oregon. The women carry their own weight with eight strong runners of their own. Leading the men is runner Mike Smith from Lacey, Washington. Lead runner for the girls is sophomore Michelle Mickel from David Douglas.

"Mickel is usually the front runner in every race," said Hodges, "with Jeanne Barnett from Molalla close behind. "The women have become much more competitive and I feel good about their progress," commented Hodges.

Speaking of progress, the women have finished second and third at all of the big invitationals. They placed second when they hosted Fort Casey. At the Thunderbird invitational held at Mt. Hood, they placed third.
