Here's my impression of a major league baseball game:

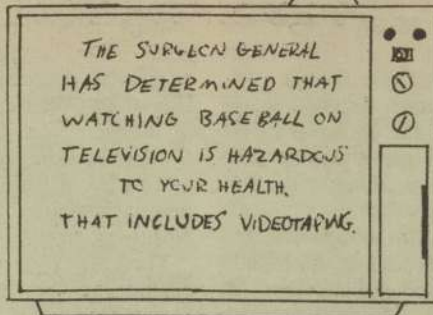
First inning: Strike one, the next pitch the batter hits the ball and the left fielder catches it. This is an out. The game will be over when 54 of these occur.
