Early classes dropped in new fall scheduling

Next fall, Tuesday-Thursday dasses will be on a different schedule, and will start at 8 a.m.

There are several reasons for this change. "Looking over the statistics of the last three years I could see that students were not attending the 7:30-9 a.m. classes," stated Lyle Reese, Dean of Instructors. "We were losing students to the 8-9am class as well," continued Reese.

"The new schedule will allow three slots for classes on Tuesday and Thursday mornings for the student who works afternoons or nights," stated Reese. The old schedule had three time slots as well, but students were often not willing to get up that early to attend a 7:30 class.

A few of the classes placed in the early time slot this term are English Compositon, Technical Report Writing and Human Relations.

The college hour, which is the time slot set aside for faculty meetings, as well as student meetings, will be 1:30-2:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. There will be two classes in the afternoon as well, the first one starting at 1:30p.m. and ending at 3p.m. and the other one starting at 3p.m. and ending at 4:30p.m.
